Reception Fire Engine Visit

It was a very exciting morning in Reception on Tuesday 18th November when four firefighters from Epsom Fire Station came to visit as part of our topic, **'People That Help Us'**.

The children loved talking to the firefighters about their jobs and learning about the protective clothing they wear to stay safe. They had the chance to hold real helmets, masks and gloves, which the children really enjoyed exploring!

The children then went outside to explore the fire engine. They were able to see the different pieces of equipment stored inside, such as the ladders and hoses. The highlight of the visit was when each child had the opportunity to sit inside the fire engine and experience what it might feel like to be a real firefighter.

When it was time for the firefighters to leave, the children waved them off. To their delight, the firefighters beeped the horn and turned on the sirens to say goodbye.

The children absolutely loved meeting the firefighters and couldn't stop talking about it for the rest of the day!



- **Year 1 Trip to Brooklands**

On Tuesday, Year One travelled to Brooklands Museum to bring their History learning this term to life! The children constructed their own peg racers, boarded an old London bus, listened to lots of facts about old cars and bicycles and explored the aircraft hangars. It was such an exciting day out and it was wonderful to see the children so engaged with the everything they saw. We think there are definitely some engineers and designers of the future in Year One!



- **Year 2 Trip to Christchurch**

On Monday, Year 2 left school to go on a cold and frosty walk to Christ Church. When we arrived, we entered the church and met Sofia and Reverend Sue who told us the plan for the morning. We talked about what we have already learned during our RE units on “What is God like for Christians?” and “Why is giving important to Christians?” and Sue and Sofia answered questions about their experiences as Christians. We went on a tour of the church and learnt about the font, the stained glass windows and the organ and then talked about all of the ways that Christ Church give and support the community. Then we made a special gift to give to someone we care about. Just before we left, Reverend Sue read us the story of ‘The Lost Sheep’ and shared what the story means to Christians. It was a great experience and really helped us to deepen the learning we have been doing in RE. We are now busy writing recounts about our visit!

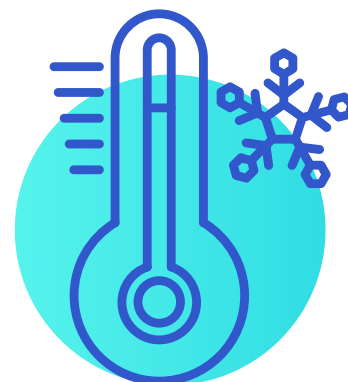
- Year 6** stepped back in time this week as they took part in an immersive World War Two workshop. The children arrived dressed as evacuees, which immediately set the scene for a memorable day of learning. Throughout the workshop, pupils explored what everyday life was like during the war. They learned about rationing, discovering just how limited food supplies were and why families had to make every ingredient count. The class also tested their nerves and steady hands with a bomb-detonating buzzer game—an exciting (and tense!) way to understand the dangers faced during air raids. The children were fascinated as they found out how the war began and what life was like for those serving in different branches of the armed forces. They even had the chance to dress up in a range of army uniforms, helping them imagine what it might have felt like to step into the shoes of a real WWII soldier. To finish the day, Year 6 completed thrilling stretcher races as their final mission before being declared “qualified soldiers.” The activity brought teamwork, determination, and plenty of laughter to the playground. The children had such a memorable day and gained a rich understanding of this important period in history. “I enjoyed the stretcher challenge as it was really fun, I learnt how much the Soviet Union helped to invade the other countries.” Emily R



● **It's cold outside!**

As the temperatures plummeted this week, we were all reaching for our gloves and scarves. Please ensure that your children have suitably warm coats, hats, and gloves in school on cold days and ensure that everything is named so that we can return lost items efficiently. There are still a number of children without a sufficient coat in school.

We do insist on school shoes as part of our uniform policy, as the children spend the majority of their time indoors. On very wintry days, children are welcome to wear boots to school and swap into their school shoes when they arrive.



● **Absence Rates at Southfield Park**

This week we met with our Inclusion Officer from Surrey who holds the school to account for children's attendance. She is happy with what the school are doing to promote the importance of attendance and to break down barriers to attendance for individuals as necessary. Despite this, we still have some children who are persistently absent (attending school for 90% or less of the available sessions). If you are struggling with getting your child to school, our Home School Link Worker would love to help. You can contact her via info@southfield-park.surrey.sch.uk

Missing school has a huge impact on children's learning and self-esteem at school. **If we are concerned about your child's attendance and the impact on their wellbeing and learning at school, we will discuss this at the parent consultation sessions next week.**

- **Lateness**

As mentioned in previous weeks, being on time for school really helps your child settle into the day and get cracking with key learning. Children are welcome to arrive at school from 8:35 and must be in by 8:50am when the gates close. From next week, the Senior Leadership Team are going to be recording children arriving through the office after this time and we will be contacting you if your child is regularly late for school.

- **Could your child be eligible for Free School Meals and other Pupil Premium benefits?**

Whilst children in Reception to Year 2 automatically receive Free School Meals, you may still be eligible for other benefits e.g subsidised clubs, trips and access to the local Holiday Activity and Food camps. You may be eligible for these benefits if you are in receipt of any of the following:

- Income Support
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- the guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190.
- Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

What is "OAP"?



Old Age Pensioners??

If you've ever heard the term OAP and thought, "Are we talking about pensioners?", you're not alone! It stands for **Ordinarily Available Provision** - the support that every school should already have in place to help all children learn, thrive, and feel included.



Starter Pack of Support

Think of OAP as the starter pack of support. It's what schools can ordinarily offer, without needing extra funding or formal plans, to meet children's different needs. Every learner is unique: some might need extra time to process information, others benefit from visual timetables, sensory breaks, or reassurance to manage big emotions.

Recipe for Inclusion

In Surrey, schools use the OAP, a big, practical toolkit covering everything from communication and learning to emotional wellbeing, sensory, and medical needs. It's like the ultimate recipe for inclusion:

- 🍎 A dash of visual support (pictures, symbols, or "now and next" cards)
- ✏️ A sprinkle of adapted work so tasks fit your child's level, not just their age
- 🕒 A spoonful of patience - giving time to think or speak



Checklist

There's an online OAP checklist for parents on [Surrey County Council's website](#) and the [Surrey Local Offer](#), arranged around the four main areas of need from the SEND Code of Practice:

- Communication & Interaction
- Cognition & Learning
- Social, Emotional & Mental Health
- Sensory / Physical

Many children have needs across more than one area.



Key Terms

This all falls under **High Quality (or Quality First) Teaching**, where lessons are designed to be accessible for everyone, not just those who find school easy.

Reasonable Adjustments are the practical tweaks and adaptations teachers make to ensure children with additional needs can fully take part in school life.

Additional Support refers to any extra help beyond what's ordinarily available, such as targeted interventions, advice from specialists, staff training, or extra resources.
