Key Concepts:

Key Vocabulary

Cyber bully	Intimidating or threatening someone online.
Password	a secret word that only you know. It might have jumbled up numbers and letters, to make it hard for someone to guess. Having a secret password means only you can login.
Personal Information	Information that could be used to identify someone.
Private	Sharing something with only a small trusted group of people.
Netiquette	Being polite online (etiquette on the net)
Appropriate	Suitable, Sensible.
Concern	Express an uneasy feeling about an issue or situation.

- Date of Birth
- Address
- School name
- Parent's full names
- Photographs of us or our home.

Who are your safe adults?

To create a safe password:

- Use a combination of lowercase and capital letters
 - Use numbers or .?!,*
- Use a phrase and use the initial of each word
 - Mix up the letters

It is important YOU remember it!

Be smart on the internet

SAFE Keep safe by being careful not to give out personal information – such as your full name, email address, phone number, home address, photos or school name – to people you are chatting with online.

MEETING Meeting someone you have only been in touch with online can be dangerous. Only do so with your parents' or carers' permission and even then only when they can be present.

ACCEPTING Accepting emails, IM messages, or opening files, pictures or texts from people you don't know or trust can lead to problems – they may contain viruses or nasty messages!

RELIABLE Information you find on the internet may not be true, or someone online may be lying about who they are.

TELL Tell your parent, carer or a trusted adult if someone or something makes you feel uncomfortable or worried, or if you or someone you know is being bullied online.
