- In 1955, she refused to give up her seat on a bus to a white person.
- At that time, white people and black people were kept apart in some American states.
- Her actions changed American history forever.

Equality	When each person is seen as equal.
Movement	A group of people acting as one.
Suffragettes	A woman seeking the right to vote through organized protest
Segregation	Setting someone or something apart from others.
Activist	A person who campaigns for change.
Boycott	When you deliberately stop doing something.
Civil rights	Human rights. E.g. the right to have shelter and food.
Society	Human beings together.
Protest	Showing you are against something.
Racism	when people are treated unfairly because of their skin colour or background.
